In the end Gempa was pinned under his own stones and one by one his arms stopped moving. Even so, he broke free and fled to the caves of Gua Dalam. One of Suraya's daughters followed and kept watch, in case he ever came back for revenge.

Suraya had beaten Gempa at last, but her victory was not complete. She still had to face his brother, whose footsteps shook the ground just as hard. That fight was harder than she expected. Again and again her strongest gusts did almost nothing.

Suddenly Gempa's brother flung a boulder at the wing of one of Suraya's daughters. She drove him off with a blast of wind so fierce that it carried him all the way to the coast. Her daughter was badly hurt and knew she would never fly again. She asked to stay by the sea and watch for Gempa's brother, so that he could never return. Suraya agreed, and told the farmers of that shore to bring her daughter a basket of rice and a bundle of dried fish each week. They were glad to do it, because the brother's footsteps had split their fields and toppled their stores.

Whenever the ground shook after that, the farmers hurried to leave offerings, hoping to calm the fury of the spirit. Then they stood beneath a tall waringin tree, whose leaves whispered the voice of Suraya.
